Catholic Homes has joined an alliance of local governments to deliver better in-home and community services to older people in the central and eastern Wheatbelt.

The Central East Accommodation and Care Alliance (CEACA) comprises 11 member shires that delivered 71 two-bedroom units in the region and it has asked two providers to supply home care services.

The key aim of the Catholic Homes-CEACA partnership is to provide the services and supports to enable clients to age well in their own home, connected to their family, friends and community services and amenities.

Executive Manager Home and Community Care Kylie Steele said Catholic Homes is well placed to provide a wide range of supports that meet the needs of older people and their families. "We want communities to thrive and people to be able to get the services they need - our friendly and skilled team works with our clients to help them achieve their goals and live their best life at home," she said.

# THE ROAD TO Recovery

Suffering the crippling effects of myalgic encephalomyelitis, also known as ME or chronic fatigue syndrome, took former police officer Anthony Wallace "down a deep hole".

The misunderstood disease nearly destroyed Tony, who has endured the decade-long condition that leaves him mentally and physically exhausted, unable do even basic daily tasks.

"ME attacks your entire body and you end up with a very limited ability to function," he explained.

"When it's bad, you can't even put a sentence together. For a long time, my world was limited to watching the television."

A relapse in 2017 led to his medical retirement from the WA Police Force. In 2020, Tony's marriage ended after his illness



"took its toll" on his wife, leaving him "in the wilderness" of confusion and pain.

Now, very slowly, Tony is coming out of the wilderness, thanks to the compassion and care from our Home Care staff.

Since first receiving support from Catholic Homes earlier this year, Tony said his life "has been totally transformed in every respect".

He receives three visits a week from Support Workers Melanie and Krystin, who with Case Manager Sara, help Tony in and around his home and, very importantly, out and about in the community for shopping and other trips.



"This is the best I have been since 2017. I hope to improve incrementally because a cure is not in the pipeline," Tony said.

"Sara is working so hard to get me the appropriate services and the carers have become just like family because they are so focused on what is best for me.

"I look forward to my carers attending - my world has opened up again - it is bigger than a television screen now."

Tony is seen here enjoying a new garden we helped put in and, as for the future, he wants to adopt a rescue dog as a companion when his health allows.

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Her love for the bush and Australian landscapes comes from growing up in northern New South Wales where her parents worked as country doctors.

Later, she fell in love with husband Ron, and the Pilbara region, after moving to Tom Price with him for work.
