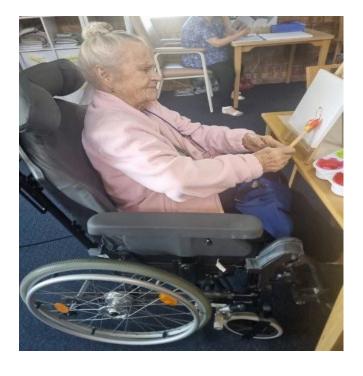
## February fabulousness by the ocean

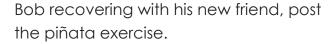


#### **ARCHBISHOP GOODY**

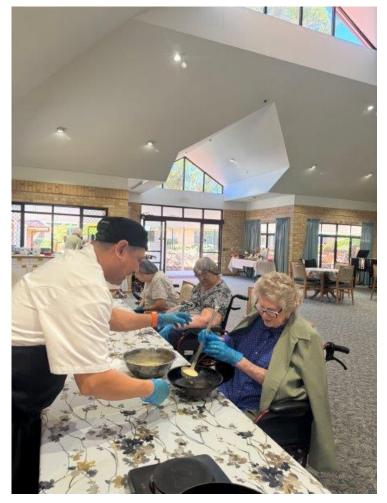

## LESLEY'S RECIPE Farmhouse Lamb Shank Soup

#### **INGREDIENTS**

1 onion chopped into chunks

2 lamb shanks

1 carrot chopped

1 sweet potato chapped

runner beans, cut into bite-sized lengths

½ cup pearl barley

1 chicken stock cube

3 cups hot water

Salt to taste – taste it as you go along the salt cubes may be salty enough.



#### METHOD

Fry onion. Add lamb shanks and cook until browned. Add all other ingredients and bring to the boil. Cook gently for 1 hour or until meat is soft and tender. Remove the lamb shanks, cut the meat off the bones and return meat to the soup. You can vitamise, blend or sieve the whole soup, or leave it chunky, or leave some chunky and vitamise the rest. Lesley's Dad loved tasting the chunks of meat so she used to vitamise the rest of the soup before returning the meat.

Serve with buttered slices of French stick or baguette bread for dunking. For extra yumminess add a sprinkle of grated parmesan cheese onto your slice of buttered bread before dunking.

This is a healthy meal, and a great recipe for filling up people who don't eat much, such as elderly people, and getting lots of goodness into them. It freezes well in small portions ready for meals on another day.

Carrot, sweet potato & beans are Lesley's preferred vegetables. You can add any vegetables you like.
